- 27 Aug 1801 An Ebenezer Leman bill relating to 36 iron belaying pins for ship.
- 2 Sep 1801 Talbot requested return of a 12-pdr from the Island, complete.
- 10 Sep 1801 "making [lead lined] cistern to Pumps"
- 28 Oct 1801 6 tons of 34' pine and 5 tons of 12' pine received by Edward Hartt for use in float stages for the ship.
- 10 Nov 1801 Ephraim Thayer completed repair to fire engines, including "...leathering the valves and Pistons of...[2] Engines...," "...leathering the Suction Cock...," "...arms to the [Engine] axletrees...," and "...brake handles..." Cost: \$36.
- 24 Dec 1801 Advertised for "seasoned knees" for the ship.
- 1801 Excerpts from an annual recapitulation of Ebenezer Leman's work for the ship include "Tiller for the Barge," mending Engine," "hanging the Bell."  - Ship needs 2 lower yards, 2 topsail yards, 2 topgallant yards, and "Oak Timber for Cross Trees."
- 8 Jan 1802 Larrabee Edes' bill for glazing 60 squares 7 x 9 glass.
- 20 Jan 1802 Joseph Roby's bill for repairing "tin work in poop Lantn," also "Top Light."
- 7 Feb 1802 Ship had a 27' cutter made of oak and pine.
- 2 Mar 1802 Materials used to date in ship's repair:

- 24 Jan 1803 25 men in maintenance crew.
- 26 Jan 1803 Ship was moored at Union (Mays') Wharf 15 Oct 1801 2 Jul 1802.
- 22 May 1803 Nathaniel Haraden reports to Commodore Preble rigging requirements for heaving the ship down:
 - 2 4-strand fine yard 10" purchase falls, 140 fathoms each
 - 50 fathoms 13" 4-strand fine yard for block strapping
 - 60 fathoms 7" 4-strand rope "to strap the Blocks for setting up the careening pendants"

 - 120 fathoms 7" 3-strand rope for "necessary uses"

- 24 May 1803 Haraden reports to Preble the ship needs 12 ash oars 16 1/2-18' long. (A later bill indicates these were made by Thayer.)
